Ben's Call

FAITH, FAMILY, AND A FUTURE BEHIND THE MIC

Born with cerebral palsy and autism, Ben Land doesn't have the fine motor skills to play the sports he loves – but that hasn't slowed him down.

"Everything in my life has a significant degree of difficulty attached to it," Ben said. "It is difficult for me to comb my hair, button my shirt, and hold a fork. I cannot tie my shoes, and unspoken social situations are confusing to me. However, when I go to a ballgame or turn the volume down and call a game that is on our television, I feel like I completely belong."

With an almost photographic memory, and a deep passion for athletics, the East Central Community College sophomore is forging a path towards a career in sports broadcasting – showing that different abilities can lead to exceptional achievements.

"I knew I would never be able to physically play sports," he said. "But due to my neurological diversity, I can see the games in my mind and remember statistics like they're photographs."

That special gift led Ben to launch "The Yellowjacket Buzz," a podcast now in its third year on the Union High School website. In his podcast, Ben covers every sport at UHS from football and powerlifting to band and cheer – encouraging athletes and coaches and celebrating their hard work.

Deanna Rush, UHS academic counselor, remembers when Ben enrolled at the high school following years of home-schooling.

"In a matter of days, Ben became the most popular kid on campus," Rush said. "Everyone embraced him and his very warm and fun personality. I think he knew every student's name, every athlete's stats, and every teacher's favorite college sports team. Ben truly had great support from his peers who always cheered him on or supported him in any way they could. They did this because Ben did that for them; in his time at UHS, Ben truly was everyone's biggest cheerleader."

Thriving at East Central

Since arriving at East Central in fall 2024, Ben has embraced college life – and the campus community has embraced him right back. He's formed friendships with Warrior athletes, been inducted into Phi Theta Kappa honor society, and found numerous ways to get involved.

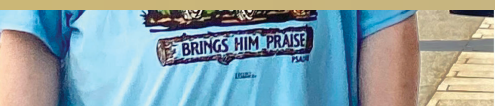
"I enjoy participating in service projects," he said. "I like to help people. Throughout my life, the Lord has blessed me with people who were willing and wanted to help me. I want to serve the Lord and pay that kindness forward."

He has helped PTK raise money for a special needs prom and has attended as many EC sporting events as possible. He studies in the Success Center and to help with his mobility issues works with a student sports trainer on campus.

"I am enjoying my experiences at ECCC. I like the family atmosphere that is evident on campus. Everyone at ECCC is supportive, encouraging and interested in the students' success."

Rooted in Faith and Family

Ben's journey would not be possible without the constant support of his mother, Kathy, and his "Granna," who have dedicated their lives to helping him succeed. His mother and late father, Tim, adopted Ben when he was just over a year old. Kathy at-



tends his college classes to take notes for him when needed, while Granna helps prepare study materials and ensures he keeps up with assignments.

"My mother is my inspiration," Ben said. "She's patient, kind, encouraging, always praying for me — and she loves sports. How great is that? She and Daddy adopted me when I was 15 months old. I could not speak, sit up or eat. Daddy died when I was five. Mother had no siblings, no uncles, aunts, or cousins. She prayed that the Lord would send someone to help her determine how to give me the best opportunities for my future. Mother told me she knew how to love me, but she needed help with everything else. The Lord sent the matriarch of a family in our church, and she became my Granna. She didn't have to love me — but she chose to."

His mother, reflecting on their journey together, said, "As Ben's Mother there have been so many experiences that have taken my breath away. One experience that I hope I never forget was the day Ben came into the den of our home and said, 'Mama, what's the matter?' I told him I had experienced a bad day. Ben looked at me with a puzzled expression and said, 'Mama, what is a bad day? I have never had one of those.' Ben sees every day as a gift and every person he meets as a blessing. I can never find enough words to express what a gift Ben is to my life. I am blessed beyond measure to be given the gift to become his mother."

Like any parent, Kathy says she just wants to see Ben happy with his life. "He enjoys college and is learning so much about participating in social situations. Ben's biggest challenges are his mobility and keeping up with his time schedule. My biggest challenge is letting go."

Mentors Who Make a Difference

Kathy said elementary school came with challenges and by middle school, she thought it best to homeschool. Although she is now retired, Kathy was still working at the time, so she reached out to East Central for support.

"I was still teaching and could not be at home. Ben's Granna was teaching him, but we needed help. So, Phi Theta Kappa assisted me and provided three education majors to work with Ben five days a week on academic and social learning. In return, these students received credit for service hours while they assisted Ben. They were instrumental in helping Ben be where he is today."

One of those tutors, Rachel Laird (now Harris), would later become his English Composition teacher at East Central. Harris remembers their early days together — practicing conversations, learning social cues, and starting his sports blog.

Harris said, "In the beginning, a lot of what we did together was just life: doing things like practicing holding conversations, maintaining eye contact, and being tactful about personal space. Because we were homeschooling at the time, we incorporated both academic and social learning into living daily life. We did follow an online curriculum for part of the day, but we also practiced skills like cooking, cleaning, and running errands."

While encouraging him to improve his writing skills, Harris helped Ben start his sports blog where he wrote about games he had watched that week. She said what started as posts for her and his grandmother quickly expanded to his church family and the community and would eventually lead to a position writing sports for The Neshoba Democrat, a local newspaper.

"The day that his sports blog gained him an interview on a statewide level was such a surreal moment and seeing him now getting ready to head to MSU to major in Sports Communica-



tion and Broadcasting brings me awe as I remember where we started."

At East Central, Land has also found a mentor in ECCC history instructor Madison Price, whom he said is one of his favorite teachers.

"He has a great sense of humor," Land said. "We often talk about sports after class. He is very calm, easygoing, helpful and encouraging."

Dr. Amanda Walton, ECCC's ADA coordinator, has also become a close ally. "Ben is my buddy," she said. "He's an amazing person — intelligent, kind and incredibly passionate about sports. He'll be a phenomenal broadcaster."

Walton recalled a friendly rivalry over college sports and how Ben checks in every Monday to discuss the latest games. "I'm not looking forward to the day he leaves EC," she said. "He's one of a kind."

Looking Ahead

Ben plans to graduate from East Central in spring 2026 and transfer to Mississippi State University to pursue a degree in communications with a focus on sports broadcasting. His dream is to one day work for the SEC Network and be involved in the sports information department at MSU.

Kathy said, "We are already setting up campus visits. The professors at the TK Martin Center at MSU have been very helpful in the past, and so we plan to lean on them as well. Dr. (Chelsey) Vincent at EC has also been very helpful in planning Ben's future at MSU."

Encouragement for Others

Ben said he is grateful to the Lord for bringing him to ECCC where he has had the opportunity to meet so many wonderful people and he offers this heartfelt advice to others with disabilities: "Don't be afraid to ask for help. People can't read your mind. At EC, people will help in any way they can. I am treated with respect and my difficulties do not define my level of success. Every student who comes to EC will be valued and appreciated for the unique individual they are."

Kathy echoes Ben's sentiment and said everyone at EC has been instrumental in helping Ben build confidence apart from her and have been supportive and respectful of Ben's abilities

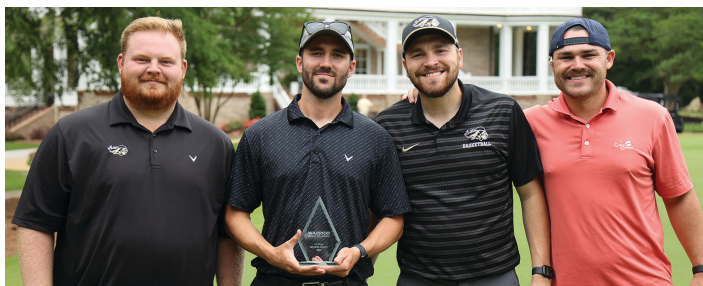

FROM THE COTTON FIELDS TO THE PHARMACY: A JOURNEY OF DETERMINATION & DISCOVERY

Growing up on his family's cotton farm in Walnut Grove, Sonny Upton knew early on that it wasn't the life he wanted.

"I always knew I didn't want to be a cotton farmer" he said. "Growing up, that was the path laid out before many of us, but it wasn't for me. I graduated high school in 1949, and without wasting any time, I headed straight to boot camp. My training took place in San Diego, and from there, I was sent to Guam—arriving on Christmas Eve. I remember thinking, 'What in the world have I gotten myself into?'"

In August 1952, while in Japan, Upton broke his leg. He returned to the states where he was assigned to NAS Millington, just north of Memphis, where he remained until his scheduled discharge the next year.

On leave, Upton hitchhiked home – on crutches in a cast that covered him from hip to ankle. Around midnight, he was stranded between Canton and Carthage on Highway 16. After that ordeal, he decided it was time to buy a car. That decision would change his future.

"At that point, I had no idea what I wanted to do with my life," Upton said.

"That changed when I ran into an old friend, Cecil Caldwell, who had just graduated from pharmacy school at Ole Miss. I hadn't seen him in four years, but I knew his younger sister from school. Cecil didn't have a car and needed a ride to Oxford, and I was headed that way. I agreed, and on the trip, we got to talking.

"Cecil asked what I planned to do with my life. I told him I had no clue. He encouraged me to attend pharmacy school. I told him I was not a very good student, but he wouldn't take no for an answer. He told me to give it a shot and even got me a course catalog."

The summer of 1953, Upton enrolled at East Central. His first classes: freshman chemistry and English.

"I had no idea what I was getting into," he said. "I flunked chemistry the first time, but I knew I had to pass, so I took it again that fall and passed.

He had Ms. Woodward for English, having been told to steer clear of Miss Una Harris – an EC legend who was known for her excellent but difficult classes. That next summer, he enrolled in organic chemistry.

"We started with about fifteen students. Eventually, everyone dropped out but two of us. Then the last one's wife went into labor, and he had to leave. That left me alone in the class. Mr. Cross, our professor, would lecture for two hours,

take a lunch break, give me instructions and then leave me alone in the lab to work. He loved to fish and quail hunt, and I guess he trusted me to complete the lab work on my own. That summer, I fell in love with organic chemistry."

Upton described Mr. Cross as tough—someone who cared about technique and discipline. "Spill acid on one of his lab countertops, and you'd hear about it. He taught me how to be precise, how to respect the work. His lessons stuck with me my whole life. I wouldn't have made it if I had gone somewhere else first."

East Central's campus had about 600 students at the time, and Upton, a bit older after four years of military service appreciated the friendly, welcoming atmosphere.

East Central also had competitive sports teams. A few years prior to enrolling and while on leave from the military, Upton attended a basketball game having heard from his sister, Shirley, about the unbeaten Warriors who were destroying every opponent.

"I arrived too late to get inside Founders Gym—it was packed wall to wall," he said. "I had to watch the game from the doorway. I remember players like Denver Brackeen, Howard Sessums, and a guy known as Yank who was from North Carolina. Yank was unstoppable. Three of our players got up on the stage and sat

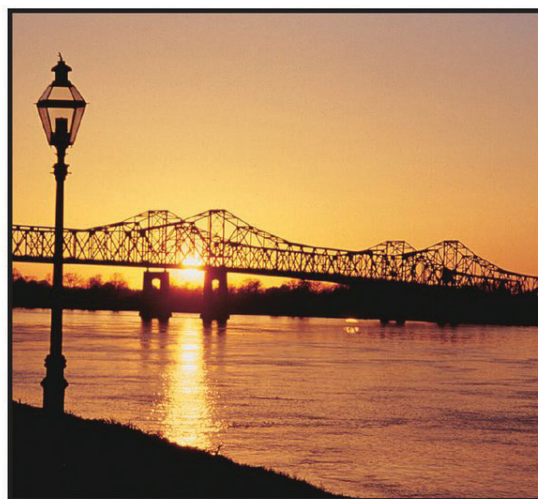

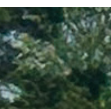
BASEBALL ALUMNI DAY BRINGS FORMER WARRIORS BACK TO THE DIAMOND

in folding chairs and left two EC players playing the other team's five. They couldn't get the ball away from Yank. They'd put two men on him and still couldn't get him."

Upton lived on campus and remembered his roommate fondly- Bill Acton, from Alabama. "He married Jeannie Monk from Lake, and I was in their wedding. They eventually moved to Magee, where he worked in poultry production," he said.

Upton also discovered a few unexpected favorite classes. "I had to meet a minimum number of hours for the GI Bill, so I took economics with Mr. Bobo—not part of the regular curriculum, but I loved it," he said. "I also took literature under Ms. Newsome. She could entrance a room—her teaching made stories come alive. I wish I could've taken more of her classes."

After two summers and one full academic year, Upton made plans to transfer to Ole Miss for pharmacy school.

"By this time, I had met Pat—Patricia McCraney from Newton. We had started dating. When I told her I was leaving for Ole Miss, she said, 'Well I'm coming with you.' We got married in Newton at her

aunt's house not long after."

The newlyweds loaded up everything they owned in a borrowed two-wheel trailer—dishes, crystal, a kerosene stove, and a mattress that his father had given them.

"Somewhere outside Vaiden, that mattress flew off the car, and we looked like the Clampetts trying to get it tied back down," he said.

The moved into Vet Village in Oxford, a complex for military veterans. Rent was \$9.40 a month. Everything ran on kerosene.

"Our clothes always smelled like it," Upton said. "We'd walk into class, and the richer students could smell us a mile away. It was cold in the winters. Our son Johnny was born while I was still in school, although he was delivered back at the hospital in Newton."

Pat was a piano major—having been taught by Mae Hogan and East Central instructor R.G. Fick. Upton said, "She was a talented pianist and taught at a nearby county school to help make ends meet."

After graduation, Upton's first job was at City Drug Store in Carthage. He made \$400 a month and never asked how many hours he would be working. After six months, while visiting Pat's parents in Laurel, he was offered a new job and a \$200 raise. After a few years there, he

took a job in Richton and would then go on to serve as a hospital pharmacist at Laurel General.

Five years later, he purchased Upton Drugs in Newton where he served his community for 27 years before retiring.

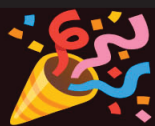
The Uptons were married 54 years and resided in Newton until moving to Decatur just a short time before Pat passed away from cancer in 2008. They raised three children: Johnny, William David—who died in a car accident—and Scottie.

When asked what advice he would give to current ECCC students, Upton said, "Never stop learning—you never know where life will take you."

East Central Community College is excited to launch an all-new Marketing Management Technology program in August 2025, offering students hands-on training for careers in sales, advertising, digital marketing, public relations, and management.

With limited seats available, college officials are encouraging interested students to enroll as soon as possible.

The two-year program leads to an Associate of Applied Science degree, with opportunities to earn stackable career and technical certificates along the way. Courses include Principles of Marketing, Personal Selling, Advertising, E-Commerce, Digital Media Applications, and Consumer Behavior, providing students with a strong foundation in business and marketing strategies.

"The marketing industry is rapidly evolving, especially with the growth of digital platforms," said Cody Spence, Director of Career & Technical Education. "This program is designed to prepare

students for in-demand careers, whether they are entering the workforce or advancing in their current jobs."

Students will gain experience in entrepreneurship, event management, human resource principles, and merchandising math, ensuring they are well-prepared for mid-level management roles. The program also includes work-based learning opportunities to help students build real-world experience before graduation.

Selected to lead the new program is Makaeya Vincent ('18).

"We are thrilled to have Makaeya join the ECCC family," said Spence. "Her background in digital media, marketing, and student recruitment will be invaluable as she helps our students develop the skills they need for success in this rapidly growing field. Makaeya's commitment to student success and her hands-on experience make her the perfect fit for this role."

Vincent comes to ECCC from William Carey University, where she served as

a recruiter and admissions counselor. In this role, she played a key part in increasing applications by nearly 50% and managed social media efforts for the Admissions and Intercultural Studies departments. She also worked as the on-air representative for university news and admissions initiatives and helped produce a wide range of marketing materials.

"I'm excited to return to East Central as an instructor and contribute to the academic success of students in marketing technology," Vincent said. GRADUATES CELEBRATE ACCOMPLISHMENTS, LOOK TO THE FUTURE

Nearly 400 graduates were awarded degrees and/or certificates during East Central Community College's Commencement Ceremonies held April 30 and May 1 in Huff Auditorium on the Decatur campus.

ECCC President Dr. Brent Gregory awarded degrees and certificates during four ceremonies honoring ADN graduates, Career and Technical Education students, and two groups of academic graduates.

Across all four ceremonies, student speakers shared sentiments of deep gratitude, strong faith, and anticipation for the future. Whether heading to hospitals, shops, classrooms, universities, or beyond, the Class of 2025 leaves East Central not just with degrees, but with purpose.

Association Degree Nursing

Representing the Associate Degree Nursing graduates, Emily Smith delivered a powerful message shaped by compassion, discipline, and deep faith.

"Nursing school is meant to teach you a completely new way of thinking," she shared. "Although much time is devoted

to learning about individual disease processes... the end goal is being able to think like a nurse."

Smith shared three key lessons with her classmates. The first: remember where you started—a call to humility and kindness toward future students. "Nothing will ruin a clinical day quite like an experienced nurse treating you like you are a waste of their time and space," she said candidly.

Her second point reminded graduates that self-care is more than a trend—it's a necessity. "Self-care is often much harder than it looks. It's asking for help... it's talking to a therapist when you feel overwhelmed."

Finally, she credited her perseverance to her faith: "It is not through my strength that I am standing here today, but through His." Smith concluded with a tribute to the faculty, families, and Florence Nightingale herself, who once said, "Let us never consider ourselves finished nurses. We must be learning all of our lives."

Other nursing graduates participating in the 10 a.m. ceremony on April 30 were Dylan Gomez who gave the invocation

and Nadia Johnson who led the benediction.

Career-Technical Education

For students completing Career and Technical Education programs, fellow graduate Jacob Howell offered an address full of pride and gratitude.

"This is a momentous occasion," he began, "a celebration of the sacrifices and challenges we have overcome to achieve this milestone."

Howell emphasized that every graduate's success was the product of many hands and hearts: "To the faculty and staff—it's clear you care deeply about your students. And to our families, your encouragement and unwavering support made this all possible."

Quoting Laozi—"The journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step"—he reminded peers that their next step, whether into the workforce or another program, would be powered by the skills and confidence they built at EC.

Humanities Instructor of the Year

ROBBINS PRESENTS MODERN MYTHOLOGY IN PROFESSIONAL WRESTLING

Bradley Robbins, an English instructor at East Central Community College, was selected the college's 2025 Humanities Teacher of the Year.

This is the ultimate collision of two of my greatest passions and I cannot wait to share!"

A HISTORIC YEAR FOR ECCC ATHLETICS

East Central Community College just wrapped one of the most successful years in its proud athletic history, further solidifying its reputation in Mississippi and among NJCAA programs nationwide.

In 2024-25, Warrior Athletics delivered an inspiring season filled with championship runs, national tournament appearances, and academic excellence. From the gridiron to the classroom, from the baseball diamond to the cross-country course, East Central student-athletes are excelling in every arena.

Highlights from the 2024-25 Warrior Athletics Season

- ECCC Warrior Football (8-3) won the MACCC South Division, defeated Holmes in the MACCC Playoff semifinals and hosted the State Championship Game for the first time in school history.

- ECCC's Men's and Women's Cross Country teams both produced the individual Region 23 Champions at the



NJCAA Regional Meets held in Alabama.

- ECCC Men's Basketball (17-13) qualified for the Region 23 Tournament for the third year in a row and won their first-round game at Southwest advancing to the quarterfinals.

- ECCC Women's Volleyball officially launched and signed a full roster in preparation for the 2025 season.

- ECCC Men's Golf qualified for the NJCAA District Tournament again, and the Warriors' top golfer, Will Thompson, qualified to compete individually at the NJCAA D-2 National Tournament where he secured a Top 50 finish in the 4-round

event.

- ECCC Softball (24-19) qualified for the Region 23 Tournament again, marking the 20th time in the past 21 seasons the Lady Warriors have qualified for postseason play.

- ECCC Baseball (46-16) made history again, becoming the first Mississippi team to make 3 consecutive trips to the World Series in Enid, OK and finishing 3rd for the second year in a row. The 2024-25 Warrior Sophomore class finished with 101 wins in their 2-year baseball careers.

- ECCC Warriors and Lady Warriors saw 93 student-athletes make the MACCC All-Academic teams with 37 of those being Distinguished All-Academic. In addition, 7 teams had an overall GPA of 3.0 or higher.

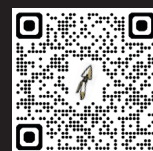

Willis Inducted into MACCC Hall of Fame

East Central Community College alumnus Jason Willis ('99), a Philadelphia native and Neshoba Central High School graduate, was recently inducted into the Mississippi Community College Sports Hall of Fame.

Willis was a member of the 1998 team that won the college's first State Championship. During his two-year stint, the Diamond Warriors made back-to-back trips to the NJCAA Region 23 Tournament, finishing as runners-up in 1999.

A right-handed pitcher/first baseman, Willis boasted a 10-2 record during his freshman season at East Central while earning East Central's and the MACJC South Division's Most Valuable Player Award. He was named All-State and All-Region. He also posted a .337 average at the plate with 13 home runs and was a 24th-round New York Yankees draft pick.

During his sophomore season in 1999, Willis finished with a 10-5 record and led Region 23 in strikeouts with 127. Willis

set a Region 23 Tournament record by striking out 18 men in a single game. He allowed only four hits and two walks during that game and hit a two-run homer. He was again named All-State and All-Region.

Earlier in the 1999 season, Willis threw a no-hitter against Southwest Mississippi Community College, the first no-hitter for an EC pitcher since 1996. That game was his fourth career shutout, an ECCC record at the time.

Willis, who originally signed with Ole Miss, opted to sign with the Yankees and spent several years in the organization's minor league, including being part of the NY Penn League's 2001 Championship squad.

Following his baseball career, Willis owned and operated a sporting goods store for several years. He currently serves as a representative for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and as Family Pastor at Trinity Baptist Church.

He said, "I'm proud of the family and the life we have built, and it all started at EC!"

"We are excited to welcome Turner Hughes as our new head tennis coach,"

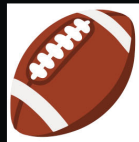

Baseball's Historic Run

WARRIORS FINISH THIRD AT NJCAA WORLD SERIES

The 2025 ECCC Warrior Baseball team under the direction of head coach Neal Holliman and assistants Zachary Crane, Innes Mackay, and Grant Griffin, experienced another historic season and punched their ticket to the NJCAA Division II College World Series for the third consecutive year.

The Warriors produced an impressive 46-16 (.742) overall mark, including a 20-8 conference record. They amassed 496 runs, hit .291 with a .431 on-base percentage, and slugged .439.

Finishing runners-up in MACCC conference play, ECCC earned the right to host

one of two regional semi-final tournaments, where they outlasted four other teams for the championship. They advanced to a best of three series with division foe Pearl River Community College for the overall Region 23 Championship where they lost two games to one and finished runners-up.

Although defeated in the Region 23 Championship series, the Warriors stellar play earned an at-large bid to the World Series in Enid, Okla.

The Warriors made a deep run in national tournament play before once again facing Pearl River in a gut wrenching semifinal loss which cut short



their quest for the national title.

Their 46-16 record is near the top of the record book for most wins in a single season with the best record set by the 2024 team who had a 55-9 overall mark. However, the sophomore members of the 2025 team would capture 101 total wins in their two-year stint -and consecutive World Series appearances - becoming the winningest class in school history.



Holliman said, "This team proved it could compete with the best. We'll build on that hunger. And we'll be back."

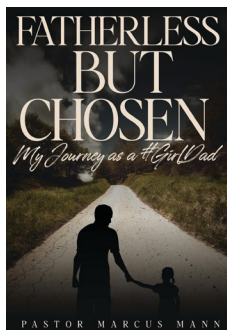
