STEP 4

APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID

It is most important that students file for financial aid during the February/March 2012 time frame. The Web site to apply is www.fafsa. ed.gov. East Central' college code is 002404. Your must complete the form for a PIN number and have a valid email address before applying.

ECCC Reports Record Spring Enrollment

A record 2,665 students are enrolled in spring semester classes at East Central Community College in Decatur, announced David Case, Dean of Admissions, Records and Research.

The new spring record surpasses the previous mark of 2,648 students who attended classes during the 2011 spring term.

Dr. Randall E. Lee, Vice President for Student Services, said the record enrollment is a result of the continued academic excellence and other opportunities for success provided by the College since its founding in 1928.

"East Central's continued growth is a reflection of a quality education and excellent employees who work hard at providing quality student service," said Dr. Lee, whose office coordinates the College's recruiting efforts. "It is amazing that the student body keeps growing despite a downward trend at most colleges!"

The vast majority of students enrolled at ECCC continues to come from the College's five-county district. Newton County leads the way with 552 students, followed by Neshoba, 549; Scott, 395; Winston, 289; and Leake, 271.

Case said 1,964 students are enrolled in academic courses and 701 students participate in career-technical programs of study.

2012-13 FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) - Grants, work-study, loans and other programs require the application results.

*Complete the FAFSA by choosing one of three following filing methods:

2. Request a paper copy by calling the Federal Student Information Center at I-800-433-324, or

3. Download and print a PDF to complete and mail at www.fafsa.gov (Select FAFSA Filing Options)

*Be sure to list ECCC's school code (002404) on FAFSA if planning to attend or apply for scholarships.

*ECCC priority date is April I (FAFSA processed by federal processors on or before this date)
Priority date ensures eligible students' complete applications will be processed in time for class and book store charges.
The priority date is also used to consider students for work study positions and for Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (FSEOG) funds.

*Applications processed after the priority date will be accepted and are encouraged; however, no assurance can be given that funds will be available in all programs.

ECCC Career-Technical Programs Offer Educational Options

Attending college doesn't mean one has to commit time and money to a four-year degree plan. It can mean that, and does for many students, but for an increasing number of college prospects, a technical degree or immediate career skills are the ticket to a great future.

East Central Community College has more than 700 students enrolled in such programs.

"Career-Technical programs at ECCC give students the technical training, as well as the hands-on experience, that will make them successful in their chosen field of study," said Wayne Eason, Director of Workforce Educa-

tion. "Once finished with the degree, many programs are also offering students the option to take National Skills Certification and other certifying tests that will make them valuable to future employers."

The College offers technical programs in Automotive Technology, Computer Programming Technology, Computer Networking Technology, Microcomputer Technology, Office Systems Technology, Healthcare Data Technology, Hotel and Restaurant Management Technology, Culinary Arts Technology, Drafting and Design Technology, Architectural Engineering

Technology, Land Surveying Technology, Electrical Technology, Heating and Air Conditioning Technology, Collision Repair Technology, Precision Machining Technology and Early Childhood Education Technology. Career programs include Cosmetology, Carpentry and Cabinetmaking, and Welding.

Technical programs at ECCC are designed to prepare students for employment upon completion of the curriculum. Students who complete a two-year program are then eligible to receive the Associate of Applied Science Degree. Those completing a one-year option will receive a certificate.

Career programs are designed to teach students a trade and a certificate is issued upon satisfactory completion of the programs. These programs meet six hours a day, five days a week, unless otherwise specified in the college catalog or schedule. Each program includes classroom instruction and hands-on experience.

"By training students to employer designated standards, the region will be able to statistically quantify a workforce that is technicially qualified in ways

employers in a rebounding economy can respect and reward. Our goal is to produce graduates who can succeed at helping employers profit," said Roger Whitlock, ECCC Dean of Workforce Development and Education.

Highlighted below are five specific programs, which will give prospective students an idea of the course offerings.

Computer Networking Technology is a two-year program, which offers training in telecommunications, network administration and client/server systems. In addition to various elective and core courses, students will receive instruction in courses such as Data Communica-

tions, Web and Programming Concepts, Network Components, Visual Basic Programming, Concepts of Database Design, Network Planning and Design, Network Administration Using Linux and Network Implementation.

Computer Programming students, upon successful completion of the course, should be prepared for employment as a computer programmer and/or computer operator, web developer or network administrator. Instruction is provided in several different programming languages including Visual BASIC, RPG, COBAL,

SQL, Java, Script, Advanced Visual Basic, Database, Advanced PRG, Advanced COBOL, C, and XML. Hands-on experience is included on microcomputers as well as an online business computer system. This is a two-year Associate Degree program.

Precision Manufacturing and Machining prepares individuals to manufacture metal parts on machines such as lathes, grinders, drill presses, milling machines and computer numerical control equipment. Instruction includes making computations related to work dimensions, testing, feeds and speeds of machines; using precision measuring instruments such as layout tools, micrometers and gauges; machining and heat-treating various metals; and laying out machine parts. Also included is instruction in the operation and maintenance of computerized equipment. Students may choose between a two-year Associate of Applied Science Degree or the one- or two-year certificate program.

Heating and Air Conditioning Technology prepares individuals to work in engineering departments or private firms installing, maintaining and operating small or medium air conditioning, heating and refrigeration systems. Instruction prepares individuals to work in a commercial setting performing special task relating to designing ductwork, assembly, installation, servicing, operation and maintenance of heating and cooling systems. This is a two-year associate degree program.

Students who successfully complete the **Collision Repair Technology** program will be prepared for beginning positions as body, frame and refinish technicians. Instruction includes all phases of Collision Repair, including glass replacement, welding, replacement of hardware and trim items, cosmetic and structural repairs. Students may choose between a two-year Associate of Applied Science Degree or the one- or two-year certificate program.
