# **ECCC Again Ranked Among Nation's Fastest Growing Community Colleges**

For the second straight year, East Central Community College is included in the list of 25 Fastest Growing Community Colleges in the United States, according to the Dec. 9, 2013, issue of Community College Week, a national publication located in Selmer, TN.

East Central was ranked 20th in the list of two-year institutions with student enrollments from 2,500 to 4,999.

Information for the report involved enrollment comparisons from 2011 to 2012, when East Central's enrollment actually dropped from 2,675 to 2,494, a decrease of seven percent.

ECCC President Dr. Billy Stewart said the slight enrollment decrease does not diminish the college's success in attracting students, especially when compared to other state institutions.

"Although we dropped from sixth to 20th on this year's list, East Central is one of only two community colleges in the state

of Mississippi still on any list at all," said Dr. Stewart. "And even though our enrollment dipped as did so many others, it was not as significant as other institutions, which allowed us to remain on this prestigious list. Our inclusion in publications highlighting the work of our nation's community colleges goes a long way in realizing our vision of national recognition as a premier community college!"

East Central Community College received national recognition earlier in the year by Washington Monthly, which included the college in its 2013 College Guide's rankings of America's Best Community College. EC was ranked 23rd in the annual report.

# East Central, MUW Announce Partnership in Culinary Arts

Students enrolled in East Central Community College's Culinary Arts Technology Program can look forward to a "seamless" transition in continuing their studies toward a bachelor's degree at Mississippi University for Women in Columbus, thanks to a partnership announced today (Feb. 3) between the two colleges.

The Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), signed by ECCC President Dr. Billy W. Stewart and MUW President Dr. Jim Borsig during a ceremony on the Decatur campus, provides educational opportunities for students in the Culinary Arts and related hospitality fields, which at ECCC includes Hotel and Restaurant Management Technology.

"Career and technical credits earned within the ECCC program will transfer to The W," said Scott Tollison, dean of the College of Business and Professional Studies, in which culinary arts is administratively housed. "In addition, currently enrolled ECCC students will have access to The W's 'guest chefs' program that brings in leading culinary experts for demonstrations and there will be additional professional development activities for ECCC faculty members."

Dr. Stewart responded, "The announcement of today's MOA between our college and Mississippi University for Women (MUW) is just one step in the fulfillment of our plan to design and implement coherent, structured educational pathways leading to certificate and/or degree completion as well as stackable credentials that enhance students' opportunities for career advancement and upward mobility."

He added, "Today's announcement serves as an example of the cooperation and collegiality among the state's community colleges and four-year universities....Our students will be the major beneficiaries and that is the way it should be."

Added Dr. Teresa Houston, ECCC Vice President for Instruction, "This is an exciting opportunity for the students and faculty at East Central Community College to collaborate and expand their educational and professional capabilities. The clear pathways identified by this agreement will provide our students with a seamless transition that will foster their desire to complete a bachelor's degree."

Barry Karrh, now in his second year as ECCC's Culinary Arts Technology instructor, said he is "very pleased" the agreement is now in place after so much hard work between the two colleges. He added, "I look forward to sending my best and brightest students to MUW."

One such student is Chris Brown, a sophomore from Forest High School.

"I would like to thank you (EC and MUW) for providing me with this opportunity and I plan to use it to the best of my ability," Brown said.

ECCC Culinary Arts Technology program began in 2008. The W's Culinary Arts Institute is headed by Chef Erich Ogle. He and Karrh both hold bachelor's degrees from The W and master's degree from Le Cordon Bleu, the University of Adelaide.

"I'm very excited about the partnership between the Culinary Arts Institute and East Central Community College. I'm personally excited to be working again with my classmate Chef Barry Karrh. The W is thrilled to have this opportunity."

ECCC's Hotel and Restaurant Management program is led by instructor Lisa O'Neill. O'Neill holds a bachelor's degree in Hotel, Restaurant, Management and Tourism Management from the University of Southern Mississippi. She started the Hotel Restaurant Management Technology Program in 2005.

"I believe this agreement will allow an opportunity for all the ECCC Hospitality students to obtain more self-esteem in obtaining a higher degree, more job opportunities, as well as, better jobs just starting out of college, and more money earned during their entire career."

Nan Hartness of Louisville, a sophomore in the Hotel and Restaurant Management Technology program, said, "When I graduate from college, I plan on opening a restaurant. Now that my classes can transfer to Mississippi University for Women, I can enroll in the bachelor's degree program in Entrepreneurship. This degree will help me learn the business side of opening a restaurant. It will also allow me to have a broader range of career choices if I decide to do something other than open a restaurant."

Both Brown and Hartness are dually enrolled in the Culinary Arts Technology and Hotel and Restaurant Management Technology programs.

# 'Remember the Titans' Coach Herman Boone and 'Apollo 13' Astronaut Fred Haise Visit ECCC

Herman Boone (top photo), the legendary head football coach at T. C. Williams High School in Alexandria, Va., and the inspiration behind the 2000 blockbuster movie *Remember the Titans*, addresses a packed Huff Auditorium Wednesday, Nov. 20, 2013, on the East Central Community College campus. The 1971 Titans were the first integrated team at the school, where controversy developed from the selection of Boone as head coach instead of a popular white coach. "The movie was not about football....but more about the importance of working together as a team to accomplish a goal," Coach Boone stated.

Astronaut Fred Haise (bottom photo), who served as the lunar module pilot during the ill-fated Apollo 13 space mission in 1970 and is portrayed by Bill Paxton in the blockbuster film Apollo 13, spoke to East Central Community College students and guests Tuesday, February 25, 2014, in the Vickers Fine Arts Building Auditorium. During his remarks, Haise said, "Looking back, I feel fortunate to have enjoyed the career I have. I am extremely fortunate to have been around during the Apollo missions and to have been included in the program...I encourage students today to try to figure out the talent you've been blessed with. Figure out how best to use it. Figure out what's fun in school and what you're talent is. Put it into a career and that will help you succeed and have fun. Steer yourself into something you will enjoy doing every day."

Both men participated in a question and answer session led by ECCC President Dr. Billy Stewart and activities for both events concluded with a reception in the Molly McGee Gold Room in Mabry Memorial Cafeteria.
