

Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) to Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) Transition Program

Associate Degree Nursing offers a rewarding career as a Registered Nurse (RN) in a profession that is highly valued and respected. The program is designed to educate students to meet the challenges of an exciting and dynamic career in nursing. The graduate of the Associate Degree Nursing Program is prepared as an entry level nurse to provide nursing care to diverse populations in a variety of health care settings.

Admission Requirements:

- Unencumbered LPN license to practice in Mississippi.
- Completed one-year clinical work experience within the last five-years with valid documentation from employer/s.
- Apply for College admission/readmission and be accepted by the College.
- Submit a completed application for the Licensed Practical Nurse to Associate Degree Nursing Transition Program to the Office of Healthcare Education.
- Achieve an ACT composite score of 18 and a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or greater.
- Submit proof of completing all previous LPN courses with a "C" or better.
- Complete all prerequisite courses with a "C" or higher including Anatomy and Physiology I and II with labs, Microbiology with lab, English Composition I and II, and Human Growth and Development prior to taking the first nursing course.
- Complete the dosage calculation test prior to admission with a 100% pass rate.
- All applicants are required, at the candidate's expense, to take a HESI® A2 Preentrance examination.
- All applicants are required, at the candidate's expense, to submit to fingerprinting for criminal history background checks.

Associate Degree Nursing candidates are required to schedule fingerprinting with the Office of Healthcare Education prior to admission. Fingerprints are submitted to the MS Department of Public Safety and run through the Mississippi Criminal Information and Federal Bureau of Investigation databases for criminal history background checks. A satisfactory background report is expected of all students. If a student has a disqualifying event, the student is personally responsible for seeking removal of the event. Program admission eligibility may be rescinded based on review of the criminal background check and will be rescinded upon refusal to submit to a

When the number of applicants who meet minimum requirements exceed the number of available spaces, the most-qualified applicants will be chosen for admission. Qualified applicants will be considered by the admissions committee on a competitive basis using Points Category criteria.

Enrollment in nursing courses is limited to students who have been admitted to the Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) program. Couses must be taken in the sequence specified unless otherwise stated. All nursing courses must be completed with a "satisfactory" to graduate from the ADN program.

Progression/Graduation Requirements:

- Semester grade average of 80 or above in all nursing semester and courses requiring letter grades.
- Grade of "C" or better in all nursing and other required courses.
- Mastery demonstration of selected nursing skills.
- Satisfactory achievement in all clinical rotations.
- Complete all required assessment tests.

Sucessful graduates will receive an Associate of Applied Science Degree with 70 college credit hours.
