Enrollment up At ECJC for Spring Semester

An enrollment increase of over 10 percent has been reported at East Central Junior College for the Spring, 1987 semester, according to Raymond McMullan, Director of Admissions, Records, and Research.

McMullan reported there are currently 936 students enrolled at East Central, substantially more than 841 enrolled during the Spring, 1986 semester.

He said the breakdown of students by county is as follows: Neshoba, 283; Newton, 236; Scott, 143; Winston, 107; Leake, 96; out-ofdistrict, 36; and out-of-state, 35.

McMullan said there are 393 fulltime academic day students, 174 fulltime technical day students, 145 fulltime vocational day students, 35 parttime academic day students, 7 parttime technical day students, and 182 evening class students who are enrolled in courses being taught in locations throughout the five-county district.

Dr. Eddie M. Smith, ECJC President, said the higher enrollment figure was anticipated and added he foresees even larger enrollments in the near future.

"We are greatly excited about the growth in enrollment at East Central and we are enthusiastic as we project the climb to continue," said Dr. Smith.

He added East Central is once again facing the uphill task of educating more students with funding that is not maintaining the same pace with the increased enrollment.

"The need is obviously great, as more students are choosing to enroll in our junior college. I sincerely hope that funding will increase for East Central Junior College so we can continue to provide the educational services needed in our five-county district," Dr. Smith said.

EC Child Care program is the first of its kind

In August, 1986, East Central added the Child Care Attendant Program to its curriculum. The six month training program, which is the first of its kind in the state, is funded under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) of the governor's office of federal/state programs. Although the program can enroll up to 12

students, currently, there are 10 from the fivecounty area. Instructor Katherine George of Jackson said she is looking for new students to begin the next session, scheduled to begin on March 23. George, who is assisted by Mary

Lyles of Pascagoula, said, "The only requirement for entering is that students must be 16 years old or older."

Students work in the training course from 8 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. each day. Mornings are spent mostly with the children, and classroom lectures are conducted in the afternoons. According to George the advantages of the program to the students are, "It enables them to become teacher-aids in headstart programs, kindergartens, and other child care facilities. It resembles an internship program in that it pro-

vides practical experience as well as an educational background for the students.' The students rotate on a three day basis while

working with the children. While one student prepares the mid-morning snack, another is busy teaching songs to the children, or reading stories to them.

Students who successfully complete the curriculum receive a certificate at the end of the sixmonth training period. While it is possible for students to complete a two-year degree program at another college, most of the students now involved with the curriculum say they will look for jobs after completing requirements at the East Central Child Care Center.

Child Care Attendants in the course receive \$30 a week. Those with children of their own are paid an extra \$10 a week for each child.

Although maximum enrollment is 15, there are 10 children between the ages of two and five years, enrolled in the center. Mothers provide certain personal supplies, tuition, and things

such as blankets, colors, scissors, etc. The program supplies a hot lunch and morning and afternoon snacks for the children.

The Center also provides a modern, well-equipped playground for the children containing seesaws, a space ladder, a superdome, and riding horses. George said, "Physical develop-ment is promoted through a good playground facility and the other college facilities. When the playground is wet, we take the children out to play on the tennis courts with their frisbees or either walking to the gym. I feel play is important to children.'

The children are also provided an educational background of language and math skills and are helped to develop the ability to build relationships which will be helpful when they start school. They are involved in art activities that are directed toward learning skills such as teaching colors and their names. George feels that the children are learning a great deal about being independent.

The program is great for most of the mothers because out of 10 students, 7 have mothers on campus and 1 has a grandmother on the faculty. George said, "I feel this is a worthwhile program and I would like to see it progress. It's good training for the student and a good facility for childcare.'

Parents interested in enrolling their children in the center should contact East Central Junior College. The center is open from 6:45 a.m. until 5 p.m. each week day, and closes for most school holidays.

Student memorial service celebrates King's birthday

A special ceremony was held on campus Monday, January 19 to honor the memory of the late Dr. Martin Luther King, whose birthday was observed during many programs across the state and nation. The program, which lasted about 45 minutes, was held in the Fine Arts Auditorium. About 40 students attended the campus observance.

The slain civil rights leader who would have been 58 years old, was fatally shot as he stood on the balcony of the Lorraine Hotel in Memphis on April 4, 1968.

Dr. Eddie M. Smith, President of East Central Junior College, welcomed the group and noted Dr. King's "dream of equality" was meant for all Americans, not just the black or white. Dr. Smith quoted excerpts from Dr. King's historic "I Have a Dream" speech, which the civil rights leader gave in front of the Lincoln Memorial on August 28, 1963.

East Central students who participated in the program included Ronnie Bender, a sophomore from Louisville who served as program chairman and speaker; Kerry Nichols, sophomore from Union who helped arrange the program; Charles Summers, sophomore from Philadelphia who read scripture, led in prayer, and gave an inspirational talk; Tina Nunn, a Louisville freshman, solos; Delores Mullins, also a Louisville freshman who sang and provided piano accompaniment; and Freddie Hall, a sophomore from Newton, who also sang.

In making his remarks, Bender said blacks are no longer fighting a war against racism, but that the conflict is really "you against yourself." He said blacks no longer have to fight to go to school, to sit in front of the bus, or to drink from a water fountain.

"The many things Dr. King died for, we now can achieve, if we take advantage of the opportunities presented to us," Bender said.

"We are not here to mourn Dr. King's memory," he added, "but are here to give honor to Dr. King for the path of freedom and opportunity he paved for all Americans, black and white."

Summers told the crowd the black generation of today is weak.

"We do not know what it is like to be oppressed. Being black is no longer an excuse. The opportunity is there and we should not settle for just being second best," Summers said. Summers said taking a holi-

day from school, as some have suggested, is not what Dr. King would have wanted.

"Although some students may want to take off from school on Dr. King's birthday, I feel he would not have wanted that. Instead we should study even harder on his day so as to better ourselves through education," Summers said.

Ehab and Adnan enjoy being in America because people are so friendly. They also enjoy the great amount of freedom that Americans usually take for granted.

In Kuwait, Adnan and Ehab received only two television channels, but most of the programs were American. They watched "Miami Vice," "Dynasty", "Magnum P.I.", and "What's Happening." V.C.R.s are very popular, but Adnan still enjoys going to the movie and two of his favorites are "Jewel of the Nile" and "Commando."

Signs with Pittsburg State..... Kennedy earns All-American football honors

Standout defensive football player Wayne Kennedy of East Central Junior College has carved another niche in his belt of honors; and this time he has received the highest tribute paid

to a junior college player. Kennedy, a 6' 1'' 250-pound defensive tackle from Slidell, Louisiana, was recently named to the 1986 National Junior College Athletic Association All-American Football Team. A two-year starter for Coach A. J. Kilpatrick's Warrior squad, Kennedy was the only player from Mississippi to be named on the first team defensive unit. He joins Aaron Fox of East Mississippi Junior College who was selected on the first team offensive squad.

Kennedy was earlier honored by the Jackson Clarion-Ledger/Jackson Daily News when he was named the Junior College Football Player of the Year for the 1986 season.

The 20-year-old compiled impressive individual statistics last season and also led the defensive unit which was ranked nationally in several categories. Kennedy had 69 individual tackles, 28 assists, and had 10 quarterback sacks. He caused four fumbles and made four fumble recoveries. Nationally, East Central ranked fifth in total defense, allowing just over 210 yards per game; and seventh in pass defense, allowing just over 5-5 mark.

Before signing with East Central, Kennedy was an defensive outstanding noseguard at Salmen High School in Slidell. He was chosen All-State his junior year and received All-State, All District, and All-Metro honors his senior year.

So with all those honors, why did Kennedy choose East Central Junior College in Decatur, Mississippi?

"I signed with ECJC because I was impressed with Coach Kilpatrick, his staff, and I absolutely fell in love with the East Central campus. The campus, with its historic beauty. really appealed to me as did the people. I cannot say enough about the people at East Central. They are probably the nicest folks I've ever met. I also wanted to enroll in vacationaltechnical training, and I knew ECJC offered one of the best programs available, "Kennedy said

Kennedy made an immediate impact at East Central. His freshman year he was named the team's most valuable defensive player and was selected honorable mention on the All-State squad. And this past season, his sophomore year, he

was named to the All Region first team and the All-South State squad, and he was selected to play in the Mississippi Junior College All-Star football game on the South Division unit.

Coach Kilpatrick describes Kennedy as "one of the most outstanding lineman I've ever worked with."

"Kennedy is a very cooperative young man; always interested in the program and



The head football coach said when Kennedy first came to East Central, he was about 25 pounds heavier and not quite as fast. But after the first season of conditioning and regular workouts, Kennedy trimmed down, got stronger, and picked up on bench press 450 pounds and can squat 650 pounds. He runs the 40 yard dash in 4.9 seconds.

Kennedy, the son of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Kennedy of Slidell, has completed his athletic and academic careers at East Central, and has transferred to Pittsburgh State University in Pittsburgh, Kansas where he has signed a scholarship to play football and study industrial arts. Kennedy said he was recruited by Mississippi State University, Northeast Louisiana, Nicholls State, and many other universities but he chose Pittsburgh because of the curriculum offered at the school met his career needs. Pittsburgh is a member of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

Kennedy said he did not want to leave East Central, but the opportunity was available to contunue playing football and studying in his chosen profession. He added he will miss alot of people, especially his girlfriend, Bobbie Kay Smith, a freshman from Union,

And what will the future hold for Wayne Kennedy? Is professional football a possibility?

"He certainly has the talent to make it in the professional football league," Coach Kilpatrick said, adding, "And with a little luck, he just might make it!"

Guraedy was one of 28 artists chosen from more than 200 artists statewide to receive the honor. He received a check for the paintings, which were purchased for the new Jackson office of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell, and Company located in One Jackson Place.

The East Central art instructor sent two paintings, a water color entitled "Dusk Departure" and a landscape oil painting called "Semi-Seurat." Guraedy also attached a resume pertaining to his artistic background.

Guraedy has been an art instructor at ECJC for 11 years. This semester he is teaching 121 students in nine different clases. Of the nine classes, six are taught in the daytime and three are night classes. Guraedy said he usually averages about 100 students per semester.

Guraedy is a 1968 graduate of Forest Hill High School. He received a B.A. in Art and minor in Communciations from the University of Southern Mississippi in 1973 and he received a master's degree of art education from USM in 1976. He also received a graduate fellowship in art education from USM. Guraedy said he also has completed 30 hours beyond his master's degree in art at Mississippi College.

Among his honors, Guraedy received the 1985 East Central Junior College Alumni Association Distinguished Faculty Award. He serves as art critic for the Claybluff Art Association of which he is a member, in Philadelphia. He meets with association on a monthly basic.

Guraedy is past president of the East Central Junior College Faculty Club and is a member of the Mississippi Junior College Faculty Association.

For the past six years, he has been a part-time art instructor at the Meridian Branch of Mississippi State University.

He is married to the former Linda Kay Knighton of Big Timber, Montana, who is a teacher at Decatur Elementary School. They have one child, Jason Brian, age four. They attend Decatur United Methodist Church.

W.A. "Bill" Taylor, Chairman of the Board of Taylor Machine Works in Louisville, has been appointed to the State Advisory Council of the Mississippi Junior College Economic Development Foundation.

Taylor will represent East Central Junior College in Decatur on the council which is comprised of one member from each of the 15 junior college districts in the state. Taylor served as Chairman of the Board and President of Taylor Machine Works from 1968 until last year when his oldest son, Lex, was promoted to president.

Taylor Machine Works is the largest privately owned lift truck manufacturing firm in the United States.

The company, founded by Taylor's father, Alex Taylor, in 1927, manufactures and sells specifically designed material handling equipment and components in addition to the Big Red Line of lift trucks which have from 10,000-pound to 120,000-pound lift capacity.

Taylor is an innovator in the design and implementation of management systems, market research, and the utilization of computer science in the operation of all company facets.

Taylor, a native of Winston County, was born in 1931. He and his wife, Mrs. Mitzie Metts Taylor, live in Louisville with their younger son, Robert. In addition to their two sons, they have a daughter, Teresa, who is manager of market research at Taylor Machine Works and also serves as Director of the W.A. Taylor Gallery in Louisville.

Taylor attended Mississippi College and Mississippi State University. He served in the Air Force during the Korean Conflict. He is an active member of First Baptist Church in Louisville and supports several missionaries in foreign missions.

He presently serves on the Board of Directors of Mississippi State University Development Foundation, Dixie National Life Insurance Company, Jackson Symphony Orchestra, Kidney Foundation, Mississippi Museum of Art, National Association of Manufacturers, Construction Industry Manufacturers Association, and BIPAC, Washington, D.C.

Taylor is an active supporter and has served many years on the Executive Board of the Pushmataha Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America.



He also owns Taylor Equipment and Machine Tool Company which buys and sells steel, and W.A. Taylor Gallery and Art Village in Louisville.

His hobbies include goose hunting, collecting fine bronze sculpture, and American Indian paintings.

In 1981 he was awarded membership in the Omicron Delta Kappa Society (MSU Circle) in recognition of conspicuous attainment of service in college activities.

The State Advisory Council was organized to provide advice and support to the Mississippi Junior College Economic Development Foundation. Major activities of the Council include identification and promotion of appropriate economic development activities with junior colleges, identification of funding sources and entering into appropriate campaigns and activities to acquire funds for the Foundation, assisting in the image development of junior colleges, establishing Council subcommittees and/or task forces related to specific areas of economic development to give special attention to priority issues, and other activities appropriate to the support of the Foundation.

The primary purpose of the Mississippi Junior College Foundation is to promote, encourage, and assist all forms of education, research, and economic development conducted by the 15 public junior colleges in the State of Mississippi and the Mississippi Junior College Association. The foundation is composed of acting presidents of the 15 public junior colleges.

A press conference and joint meeting of the Foundation and Council was held January 28 at the Holiday Inn in downtown Jackson. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss strategies for a statewide economic development plan which capitalizes upon the regional strengths of the junior colleges. Former Governor William Winter, Senior Law Partner for Watkins, Ludlam and Stennis in Jackson, served as press conference moderator. Winter serves as Advisory Council member to the Hinds Junior College District.

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Vo-Tech gets \$158,000 boost

Funding in the amount of \$158,000 has been approved or is expected to be officially approved for new equipment at the Vocational - Technical Department at East Central Junior College in Decatur, announced O.L. Newell, Vo-Tech director. Newell said funding has also been approved to pay part of the salary for the remedial instructor.

Newell said special funding, which came through the Vocational - Technical Division of the State Department of Education, was most recently approved in the amount of \$22,240 for ten microcomputers and printers. The regular allocation of \$35,358 was previously approved for other equipment for the Vo-Tech Department, meaning a total of \$57,598 in funds has been fully approved for new equipment.

The Vo-Tech director, who described the funding as a "shot in the arm", said the new microcomputers and printers will be set up in the Business Technology Department. Newell said the department has been operating with just twelve microcomputers and printers and added the ten new systems will be a welcomed addition for the Business Technology and Computer Technology students.

Other equipment is also being purchased for Cosmetology, Auto Mechanics, Business Technology, Vocational Individualized Developmental System, Body and Fender, Industrial Sewing (at the Philadelphia -Neshoba County Vo-Tech Center), Drafting and Design, Carpentry and Cabinet Making, and Electronic Technology Departments.

Newell said a plotter costing approximately \$4,000 will be purchased for the Drafting Department and an engine analyzer for Auto Mechanics costing about \$15,000 will be purchased from previously mentioned funds should Special Funds not be approved.

Newell said additional funding has been verbally approved for the following programs: Drafting and Design, \$35,000; Machine Shop, \$32,500; Metal Trades (at Philadelphia - Neshoba County Vo-Tech Center, \$15,000;

EC wins UM 'brain games'

For the second straight year, East Central Junior College in Decatur has captured first-place honors at the University of Mississippi Scholars Bowl competition, defeating 20 teams representing the state's junior colleges. The competition was held February 27-28 on the Ole Miss campus.

During the Scholars Bowl tournament, teams are questioned in such areas as science and technology, mathematics, humanities, fine arts, business administration, and behavioral and social sciences.

East Central team members are Chris Collins of Union, Mark Eldridge of Rolling Fork, Kevin Thompson of Philadelphia, and Robert Weidler of Decatur. The team advisor is Dr. Shelby Harris, Chairman of the Division of Science and Mathematics. The four students have a culmative grade point average of 3.82 on a possible 4.0 scale.

In winning the competition, now in its third year, each ECJC team member will receive a \$3000 scholarship to attend the University of Mississippi and East Central Junior College will receive \$700 for use in its general scholarship fund. Ole Miss Chancellor Dr. Gerald Turner will officially present the championship trophy in Decatur to Dr. Eddie M. Smith, ECJC President, and the Scholars Bowl Team at a later date.

Concerning the competition, Dr. Smith said, "Of course I'm happy and proud because of the victory by our Scholars Bowl team and the overall competition held this past weekend at Ole Miss."

"We at East Central Junior College have a longstanding tradition for academic excellence and instructional quality in our programs of study."

"Certainly we feel that the victory of our Scholars Bowl team is a reflection of the existence of that quality to which we ascribe."

After 17 teams had been eliminated, the four junior colleges remaining in the competition were East Central, Holmes (Ridgeland campus), Meridian, and Gulf Coast (Jackson County campus).

Meridian Junior College won top honors the first year of competition, and, after all the other teams had been eliminated from the double-elimination tournament, it was ironically MJC and ECJC battling for the thousands of dollars in scholarships and the championship trophy.

East Central was the last team in the competition to receive single elimination status. In earning that honor, ECJC defeated Meridian on the following question: "If a string of Christmas tree lights goes out when one bulb has burnt, how..." East Central was first to respond by answering that "the bulbs are wired in series". East Central was later defeated by Meridian but rebounded in the third match to outscore MJC 145-55 and claim the championship trophy.

Members of last year's Scholars Bowl championship team included Darrell Mangrum of Decatur, Tammy Reed of Noxapater, Stan Hardy of Philadelphia, and Alben Roland of Morton. Team captain Collins, a political science major, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Muriel C. Collins of Union. He is a President's List scholar, a member of the Warrior Corps recruiting team, Phi Theta Kappa honor society, and the Collegians. Collins also serves as Student Body Association president and was selected to Who's Who Among American Junior College Students.

Eldridge is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Eldridge of Rolling Fork, is a President's List scholar, and is a member of Phi Theta Kappa. He is also a sophomore majoring in economics.

Thompson, a sophomore, is majoring in civil engineering and is a member of the marching band, Alpha Alpha Epsilon engineering club, Phi Theta Kappa, and is secretary of the math club, Mu Alpha Theta. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Thompson of Philadelphia is a Dean's List scholar, was selected to Who's Who Among American Junior College Students, and received the Freshman math and engineering awards.

and Intensive Business (also at Philadelphia - Neshoba County Vo-Tech Center), \$18,420 for a total of \$100,920 in expected funding.

funding. The Vo-Tech director said East Central Junior College has also received a Job Training Partnership Act Related Studies Contract in the amount of \$10,000 which will be used to supplement the salary of the remedial instructor. Funding was made available through the Governor's Office of Federal-State Programs and the Division of Vocational - Technical Education.

John Adcock, Vo-Tech counselor, said there are 145 students enrolled in the Vocational studies program and 239 enrolled in the Technical studies program. Adcock noted there is a substantial increase in the Technical program enrollment as compared to the Spring 1986 semester when 180 students were enrolled.

Charles Hinson will chair State JuCo Choral Festival

Charles Hinson, choral director at East Central Junior College in Decatur, has been named chairman of the 1987-88 Mississippi State Junior College Choral Festival. The choral festival will be held in the Spring of 1988 at Hinds Junior College, which serves as host each year.

The festival is a two-day event with about 400 students participating from all 18 state junior colleges. Pumping iron...

Researchers are finding that even moderate exercise can reduce the effects of aging and actually reverse them. Among the demonstrated benefits are improved heart and respiratory function, increased muscle strength, denser bones and quicker reflexes. Today millions of people are running, cycling, swimming and walking their way to a healthier, more fulfilling life.

At East Central, some students are taking advantage of the Fitness and Conditioning class offered under the instruction of Ms. Lucille Wood. The coed class is open to anyone and it stresses the importance of fitness today. The students learn the basics of stretching and flexibility which are necessary for coordination, grace, and the prevention of lower-back pain and joint injuries.

The class also uses free weights and the weight machine. These tone up muscles which improves both posture and figure. In many instances it reduces inches in the waistline, abdomen, hips and thighs. It improves the health of one's heart, blood vessels, and lungs for a longer life. Most importantly, it increases stamina to meet life's demands and to take advantage of life's opportunities.

Students take the physical education course for numerous reasons, but one student admits that it is easier to exercise with the class instead of alone. The class meets twice a week and usually exercises for 45-50 minutes after a warm-up and stretching session. The class is full of individuals who work at their own pace and eventually build up toward their set goals. Some walk, some jog, while others run. The class is a one hour activity credit.

Mary Brown of Sebastopol said she enjoys the class and can tell a difference in the way she feels. She said that her stomach had flattened, her legs tightened, and her waist had become smaller. The freshman works with the free weights during her afternoon classes.

Lee Phillips, a freshman, enrolled in the class because he enjoys working out and can also obtain credit for it. While playing basketball at Neshoba Central, he began to regularly lift weights. In addition to the class session, he works out on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. Lee said he and others could tell a definite difference in his body strength and has increased his bench pressing mark from 130 to 200 pounds.

Elinda Williams from Union originally joined the class to lose weight. She said she was apprehensive about joining since there were so many athletes in the class. She says that she looks forward to each class meeting now and enjoys it since she works at her own pace. She began lifting 20 pounds with her arms and is now comfortable with 50. Her leg-pressing ability has tripled from 100 pounds to 300. She credits the class with lowering her once high blood pressure. She also said that her stamina and strength had noticeably increased.

In addition to Fitness and Conditioning, Beginning Tennis, Advanced Tennis and Golf are taught in the Physical Education Department. Miss Wood states, "Lots of our students are missing out on two fine life time sports. As one becomes older it will be hard to find enough people to play softball, basketball and the team sports, but most towns have tennis courts and golf courses. I have noticed our tennis courts are not being used because our people don't know how to play. Our beginning tennis is for the student who does

not know the basics of tennis. We have a high rate of success with those students who place the time and effort into both the tennis and golf classes. I have never known a person who was sorry they learned to play tennis or golf."

ECJC night school enrollment shows continued growth

For many years East Central's Night School program has been around and doing well. But, this year the program has shown a great increase in enrollment. According to Brad Tucker, Dean of Admissions, in 1985 there were 65 credit students enrolled in the program. In 1986, that number jumped to 148. When asked about the total increase, Dean Tucker said, "We feel we are making progress. More people should be enrolled, but we feel we will continue to grow. Once these centers are better established the numbers on enrollment in them will increase."

While most people think that academic classes consist of listening to a teacher lecture, reading assigned material from the textbook, and taking midterm and final exams, there are several academic classes on the East Central campus which provide "hands on" experience.

One such class is the home economics elementary clothing class taught by Alice Pouncey. Pouncey said she now has nine students enrolled in the beginning class, but all are not necessarily new to the art of

sewing. "I have all levels of students, and some who had never sat down at a sewing machine before they began this class," Pouncey said.

She explained that even though some of her students were taught how to sew in high school, they still must complete the beginning course at East Central if they are home economics majors.

The course, which is also open to non-majors as an elective, meets three days a week.

"During our lecture class which meets second period on Friday, we discuss the different types of fabrics and fibers, and also decide what materials are appropriate to use with certain patterns," Pouncey said.

The actual "hands on" experience comes during the laboratory hours which are first and second period on Monday and Wednesday.

Each semester the students are required to make three garments for themselves while learning how to set in sleeves, put in a zipper, and put on a collar. The next requirement is to recycle a garment which has not been worn in the past year. "Many of the students make such alterations as cropping a pair of long pants, making shorts out of long pants, or turning a dress into a shirt or sweater," Pouncey said.

Finally, students are required to prepare a special report on their favorite fashion designer giving a history of that person's life and describing the kind of clothes he or she designs.

Pouncey also teaches three other home economics-classes at the college. Her social usage

class meets every semester and now has 42 students enrolled in it. Several aspects of etiquette are taught such as how to set a table, how to carry on a conversation, and how to write thank you notes.

Introduction to modeling is offered in the fall, and those students in the class who make the fashion squad continue the class into the spring semester. Also, in the spring, a foods class is taught and students learn how to prepare and cook meals.

The elementary clothing class will be offered again during the fall 1987 semester.

Wendy Smith to work summer as BSU mssionary

However, this summer one EC student will put aside these ideas and will participate in something a little extraordinary.

Wendy Smith, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Eddie Smith, will be traveling to the northwest corner of the United States to spend her summer as a missionary in the states of Washington, Oregon, and Idaho.

Smith first became aware of this opportunity through the Baptist Student Union at the college. The East Central BSU helps sponsor the state BSU Student Missions program that offers college students an opportunity to work as summer missionaries for eight to 10 weeks. The missions



program is sponsored by the Mississippi Baptist Student Union in cooperation with the Home and Foreign Mission Boards and National Student Ministries.

Each year the college BSU students raise money which becomes part of the state student mission fund. These funds pay the travel costs and expense allowance for all student missionaries. Each student receives a \$50 preparation fee and an expense allowance of \$150. Also the Mississippi BSU pays for transportation to and from the destination.

Smith first had to fill out an application, and then she was interviewed by the local BSU student missions committee who recommended her to the state missions committee. She then went before the state BSU missions committee which notified her that she had been selected.

After receiving a letter of confirmation, Smith was excited to find out that during her stay in the northwest, she would be working with a music revival team.

She said, "I will be a part of a team of about four students and we will be moving around every two weeks to different areas."

"I will also be doing some general missions work which will include such things as teaching Vacation Bible School and working with youth and children," she said.

Smith will live with church families in the communities where she serves, and will be under the supervision of a Home Mission Board missionary.

The 19-year-old Wesson High School graduate is a vocal music education major at East Central and plans to attend Mississippi College in the fall.

Warriors must replace 14 starters

East Central Junior College began spring training January 25 and an optimistic head coach, A.J. Kilpatrick, said he is pleased with the first few days of practice. He said the spring workouts will continue on various days throughout the month of February. Under junior college guidelines, spring football players can work out only 20 days.

Coach Kilpatrick, whose 1986 squad finished with a 5-5 record, said he felt really good about last season, since the Warriors ended the year on a high note, winning four out of the last five games.

He was especially proud of the defensive unit, anchored by All-American sophomore tackle Wayne Kennedy. Kennedy, a 6'1" 250-pound defensive tackle from Slidell, Louisiana, has left East Central and has transferred to Pittsburgh State University in Pittsburgh, Kansas where he has signed a football scholarship.

The Warrior defense was ranked fifth in the nation in total defense, allowing just over 210 yards per game. The squad was ranked seventh in the nation in pass defense, allowing but 95 yards per game.

You will find that college is one of the most significant environmental and acadmic transitions you will ever make. The move from home to college, no matter how close or distant, is exciting. It is a time for you to grow in basic knowledge and learn to live with many new and different people.

It is a time for learning to make decisions. You must not only set the alarm for an 8 a.m. class and get up without someone calling ten times, but you must decide when to change sheets, wash clothes, and budget your time. Going to college is experiencing "a new way of life.'

If you expect to do well academical-ly, you should be studying at least one hour outside of class for every hour in class; two hours outside class should produce very good grades. Therefore, a student who is taking 15 hours of classwork should be studying between 15 and 30 hours a week.

Research proves that students who attend class regularly generally make satisfactory grades, so you will need to take responsibility for your class attendance. Instructors usually give specific guidelines for their classes at the first meeting.

So always contact the instructor if a class must be missed.

Make it a practice to study even if the instructor doesn't assign "homework". Some instructors only give two or three tests during the entire semester so the student must keep up on a daily basis. Another academic tip is to set up a

conference with the instructor to discuss your progress.

Don't assume that the instruction will call you in when you are not doing well. It is your responsibility to take the initiative to find out the instructor's office hours and make an appointment.

Plan ahead for midterm exams and final exams so that you won't be cramming at the last minute.

Mr. Raymond McMullan, Director of Admissions, Records, and Research, announced a total student enrollment increase of approximately ten percent for the fall 1987 semester at East Central Junior College.

McMullan compared the 1037 students enrolled in the fall 1987 semester to the 946 students who were enrolled in the fall 1986 semester. The totals showed an increase of 91 students, or about ten percent.

The academic full-time students increased from 438 to 486; academic part-time students increased from 14 to 29; Technical full-time students decreased from 175 to 167; Technical part-time students increased from eight to nine; Vocational students increased from 156 to 177; and Evening Class students increased from 155 to 171. From these ratios, there are 37 out-of-state students attending East Central.

Concerning the enrollment increase, Mr. McMullan said, "We at East Central are extremely pleased with this increase in the enrollment." Although he was pleased with the number of students, he pointed out his concern to continue offering the best educational programs possible at East Central.

ECJC Will Battle Pearl River Saturday

Once again an East Central Junior College football game was decided in the final seconds but this time the Warrior opponent came away with the victory as homestanding Hinds Community College tallied late to win the South division contest 14-7 Saturday night.

With the loss, East Central dropped to 3-2 overall and 1-2 in division action. Hinds improved to 4-1 overall and 2-1 in division play. ECJC will host South division opponent Pearl River Junior College at 2:30 p.m. Saturday in the annual Homecoming battle.

Pearl River, 2-3 overall and 0-2 in the division, fell 31-27 at Northwest Thursday night. East Central defeated Northwest 17-16 in

the season opener. ECJC has other wins over East Mississippi (27-19) and Co-Lin (24-23). Besides Hinds, the Warriors' other loss was a 7-0 decision at Gulf Coast.

Deadlocked at 7-7 with 13 seconds left, Hinds quarterback Mike Burch lofted a oneyard strike to all-purpose tailback Kevin Woodson for the winning score. Jason Smith added the PAT.

Burch nearly stumbled as he made the winning toss to Woodson, who was responsible for gaining 243 of the 402 yards accumulated by the Eagles. Woodson rushed 24 times for 124 yards and grabbed seven passes for 119 yards.

The 71-yard Hinds scoring drive was set up by a questionable late hit assessed against the Warriors followed by a 31-yard pass play from Burch to Woodson which gave the Eagles possession on the Warrior 23 with just under two minutes remaining. The Eagles later scored on the pass to Woodson.

After Warrior Brad Breland's 47-yard field goal attempt fell short in the first period, Hinds marched 70 yards in ten plays with Woodson scoring from the four. Smith added the PAT and Hinds led 7-0 after the first period.

Twice Hinds had excellent scoring opportunities in the second period but Warrior fumble recoverees stopped both drives.

East Central linebacker Andre Griffin recovered the first loose pigskin on the three and linebacker Angelo Smith pounced on the other miscue on the one-yard line. The half ended with Hinds leading 7-0.

East Central quickly found paydirt early in the third period when quarterback Richard Basil heaved a perfect spiral to a fleeting wide receiver Frankie Hodge who galloped 90 yards in front of the Warrior bench for the touchdown. Verandel Irons added the PAT and with 13:20 left in the third the score was tied 7-7.

The Warrior defense again stopped a possible Hinds touchdown when tackle Scottie Love recovered an Eagle fumble on the two-yard line and the score remained deadlocked through three periods.

In the fourth quarter Hinds once again knocked on the door and again the Warrior defense caused the turnover as Donnie Elliott recovered the loose pigskin.

East Central was unable to muster a sustaining drive and Hinds took over in good field position.

The Eagles marched to the Warrior 17 and it looked as if Hinds would score but on third down defender Elliott batted away a scoring pass attempt in the endzone. Hinds settled for a field goal try but Smith's 44-yard attempt failed with 4:32 left in the game.

East Central took possession but was unable to mount a drive and was forced to punt.

Hinds took possession on its own 29 and drove for the winning score.

Fund Raising Project Set To Refurnish Huff Auditorium

Plans to refurbish Huff Auditoruim at East Central Junior College were announced by Dr. Eddie M. Smith, ECJC President, at the Alumni luncheon held during Homecoming activities Saturday, October 10

Dr. Smith said the fund-raising project is divided into five phases with a total estimated cost to be approximately \$200,000. He said phases will be completed as funds become available.

Several thousand dollars were raised during the luncheon as many alumni and supporters made contributions.

Located in the center of the front campus, Huff Auditorium is the most prominent building at ECJC.

Since its contruction in 1953, it has served as the site of many commencement exercises, assembly programs, musicals, dramas, concerts, the college's first Presidential inauguration, and numerous other special events and memorable occasions.

The auditorium is named for J. Knox Huff, an attorney from Forest who served as a member of the East Central Junior College Board of Trustees for 23 years. He served as Chairman of the Board from 1948 through 1952.

Dr. Smith said there have been no major renovations of the auditorium since it was constructed. He added improvements are needed to make the auditorium more attractive and more comfortable.

Because of limited revenues, Dr. Smith said the college has not been able to fund the improvements needed in Huff Auditorium.

"It is, therefore, the goal of this project to raise the needed funds for refurbishing the auditorium from contribution from alumni, faculty, friends and other supporters of East Central Junior College," Dr. Smith said.

The project phases include the following: Replace stage curtains and window drapes; cost, \$10,000. The stage curtains are deteriorating and disintegrating due to age. The window drapes have already been removed due to disintegration. These curtains and drapes were the original ones installed in 1953. It is proposed that stage curtains and window drapes be replaced with material similar to the original ones.

Install air conditioning; cost \$70,000. It is proposed that a 50 ton air conditioning system be installed to function in combination with the existing hot water heating system. Ten inches of insulation will be installed in the ceiling to permit comfortable year-round use of auditorium.

Replace stage lighting and sound systems; cost, 32,000. The stage lighting needs to be replaced to provide lighting that is both safe for use and that is more ap-

propriate for stage presentations. A new sound system is needed to replace the system that was installed when the building was constructed.

Replace floor covering; cost, \$8,000. The original floor tile has become extremely worn and needs removing and replacing with new commercial grade tile to improve the appearance and use of the facility.

Replace seating; cost, \$80,000. This phase will involve the replacement of the original

seating with upholstered theatre seats to provide more comfort for events held in the auditorium.

All contributions to the project are tax deductible. Dr. Smith said a plaque bearing the names of all contributors will be displayed in the auditorium.

Mrs. Herrington said the main goal of the JTPA program is to decrease unemployment and upgrade education in Mississippi.

Mrs. Herrington is a graduate of Union High School and East Central Junior College, and she has a B.S. degree in Business Education from Mississippi College.

She has a degree in Executive Secretarial Training and an Adult Education Certificate in Vocational - Technical Training.

Mrs. Herrington has 17 years teaching experience in the Jackson Public School system, Phillips College, Coastal Training Institute, Canton Academy, Holly Bluff Consolidated School system, and Meridian Community College/San Diego Community College contracted with the U. S. Navy.

Newton County has the largest number of students attending East Central with 282 students. Of those students, 225 are full-time students and 148 are enrolled in academic.

Newton County also has the oldest students with 91 people being 23 or older and 66 of those are married. Twenty-nine students from Newton County scored 25 or higher on the ACT.

Neshoba County contributes 269 students. Of those, 196 are academic students. One hundred ninety-one freshman and 78 sophomores chose to attend ECJC. Twentyone students from Neshoba County scored 25 or higher on the ACT.

One hundred eighty-four students from Scott County attend East Central during the fall semester, and 88 of them chose to commute. Ninety-eight are male and the remaining 86 are female.

Scott County has 43 Technical students, and 21 Vocational students. Twelve students scored 25 or higher on the ACT who were from Scott County.

Winston County is fourth in students totals. One hundred sixteen Winston County students elected to attend ECJC, 111 of whom are full-time students. Twenty-five are commuters and 112 are single. Three students from Winston County scored 25 or higher on the ACT.

Ninety-seven students from Leake County attend East Central in the fall. Seventyeight are freshman, 8 ride the bus, 51 are dorm students, and 26 are married students. Thirteen students from Leake County scored 25 or higher on the ACT

out of state and 52 from out of district. Of the 1,037 students enrolled, 62.6% are academic students, 20.3% are technical, and 17.1% are vocational students. Eight out of every 10 are taking more than 12 hours.

Also, 71.7% of students are freshman and 43.0% of students live on campus. Females make up 52.0% of the student body, while singles dominate with 78.2%. East Central has 26.5% of its students that are 23 or older. Of the 1,037 total, 26 are veterans and 21 are divorced.

In America I have the opportunity, through hard work and determination, to turn my own dreams of happiness and success into reality. This is only possible under the Constitution. Because of the constitution I also have responsibilities as a citizen. As I accept the rights

and rewards of the Constitution, I realize that in order for other citizens to be able to enjoy their rights, I must do the things the Constitution holds me responsible for. I must uphold laws so that I don't infringe upon someone else's rights and rewards. I am responsible for paying taxes and the other duties held in the Constitution. I also have the responsibility not only to vote, but to stay well informed of the people I vote for and the political world around me.

William Gladstone once described the American Constitution as "the most wonderful work ever struck off at a given time by the brain and purpose of man". Because the Constitution has survived so many tests, it is evident that it is one of the greatest documents ever written. It has survived the trials of practical politics, the Civil War, and the immense social and economic change induced by the industrial revolution. But the most decisive of all tests that our Constitution has withstood is that of time. The Charter drafted in 1787 at Philadelphia is now the oldest written Constitution in the world.

To me the Constitution is more than just a written document of a government's laws. The Constitution spells out the rights, rewards, opportunities, and responsibilities I am entitled to as a free American citizen.

vertical drop of 1200 feet offers skiers a  $1\frac{1}{2}$  mile run with terrain and slopes for everyone.
